FOR OVER HALF A CENTURY, THE COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY (CRA/LA) HAS BEEN LOS ANGELES' PUBLIC PARTNER IN HOUSING, COMMERCIAL, NEIGHBORHOOD AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. WHEN CITY COUNCILMEMBERS, COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS, FAITH-BASED INSTITUTIONS, OR OTHER CIVIC LEADERS AND ORGANIZATIONS REQUEST THAT CRA/LA ESTABLISH A REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT Area in a community, CRA/LA works with local community and business LEADERS AND RESIDENTS TO CREATE A VISION FOR THEIR NEIGHBORHOODS. CRA/LA'S MAIN TASK IS TO LEND A HAND - TO INVESTORS WILLING TO TAKE RISKS FOR A MORE VIBRANT CITY; TO NEIGHBORHOOD RESIDENTS WITH RENEWED ASPIRATIONS FOR THEIR COMMUNITIES; AND TO THOSE IN NEED WHO STRIVE TO TAKE PART IN THE CITY'S GROWING PROSPERITY. CRA/LA HELPS: (1) INCREASE THE SUPPLY OF HOUSING FOR LOW- AND MODERATE-INCOME FAMILIES; (2) PROVIDE THE INFRASTRUCTURE FOR COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT; AND (3) CREATE JOBS NECESSARY TO MAINTAIN ACCEPTABLE LEVELS OF EMPLOYMENT. CRA/LA ALSO MAKES SURE THAT CITIZENS ARE ENGAGED IN THE DECISION-MAKING PROCESS EVERY STEP OF THE WAY.

Wilshire Center/Koreatown

The Wilshire Center/Koreatown Redevelopment Project Area is home to one of the most diverse communities in the city of Los Angeles. The project area is represented by the 1st, 4th, 1oth and 13th Council Districts. The project area covers approximately 1,207 acres and is bordered by Fifth Street to the north, 12th Street to the south, Hoover Street to the east and Wilton Place to the west.


The project area also includes the Vermont Corridor between the US-101 Hollywood Freeway on the north and 11th Street on the south, and Western Avenue between Melrose Avenue on the north and 12th Street on the South.

Currently, most of the commercial properties along Wilshire Boulevard are occupied by Korean businesses. Many art deco buildings from the "golden era" of Wilshire Center still exist, including Bullock's Wilshire (now Southwestern School of Law Library) and the Wilshire Boulevard Temple, among others. Wilshire Boulevard was, and continues to be, a high-density corridor that was designed as an automobile thoroughfare to and from Downtown Los Angeles. The Wilshire corridor contains more than six million square feet of commercial office space and provides tremendous opportunities for private investors. This area is also home to the world-famous Ambassador Hotel and Wiltern Theater, which remain historic landmarks in the heart of the project area.




WHY CRA/LA IS HERE

The Wilshire Center/Koreatown project area was adopted in 1995, three years after the 1992 civil disturbance damaged 59 properties in the area. At the time, the Wilshire Center/Koreatown project area was physically distressed and suffering economically. Approximately 95 percent of the properties required some form of rehabilitation, which resulted in low property values and affected private investment. Building vacancy rates also were rising continuously. CRA/LA recognized the need to address the signs of blight in the area and also saw the potential for bringing this area back to economic and physical vibrancy.



Success Through Reconstruction & Redevelopment

Wilshire Center/Koreatown has become an important community and commercial hub for the city of Los Angeles as a result of the following CRA/LA efforts:

- Development of the three-story Irolo mixed-use housing project, which includes 5,400 square feet of commercial retail space and the rehabilitation of existing housing units.
- Assistance with the final phase of the Wilshire Streetscape project between Hoover Street and Wilton Place, which included the planting of 2,000 trees, installation of landscaped median islands, special bus shelters, lighting improvements and two gateway monuments.
- Implementation of CRA/LA's Commercial Façade and Signage programs to enhance the exterior appearance of commercial storefronts along Western Avenue. These programs provide up to \$25,000 per storefront to qualified business owners.
- Assistance with acquiring a building at Sixth Street and Harvard Boulevard for a proposed Korean-American Cultural Center and Museum.
- Agreement with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) to develop a mixed-use transit center at the Wilshire/Western Red Line station.



The Future Looks Bright

FUTURE PLANS

CRA/LA will continue to implement its programs to enhance the Wilshire Center/Koreatown community both economically and physically.

- Development will commence for the Wilshire/ Western mixed-use transit center, which includes commercial retail uses and housing units.
- Development for a mixed-use project with a new LAUSD middle school at the Wilshire/Vermont Red Line site will commence. The project includes 11-stories of mixed-use commercial retail and affordable housing.
